



## Among environmental commitments made by parties before manifestos were released, those tackling water pollution have highest support followed by renewable energy by 2030

Setting legally binding targets to reduce the amount of sewage being **Liberal Democrats** 83% spilled in waterways that are important to wildlife and swimmers Including environmental experts on the boards of water companies, to **Liberal Democrats** 77% reduce the amount of sewage being emitted in the UK's waterways Investing in more renewable energy like wind and solar so that the UK only Labour 74% uses renewable energy by 2030 Expanding Marine Protected Areas (MPAs) to protect marine wildlife and **Liberal Democrats** 72% habitats in 50% of UK territorial waters by 2030 Setting up a publicly-owned energy company to invest in renewable Labour 62% energy generation Increasing drilling for oil and gas in the North Sea to reduce our Conservative 43% 22% dependence on energy imports Labour 34% No longer issuing licenses to allow new drilling for oil and gas in the UK 23%


